Albert Henn, founder of the Acme Machine Screw Company, hired architect Earl Andrews to design and build a 9,200-square-foot, three-story, twenty-three room Tudor Revival style home, with Bungalow/Craftsman features, as a birthday present for his wife Gertrude in 1923. Andrews designed over one hundred large houses in the City of Cleveland and the inner-ring suburbs. The home was completed in 1925 but, unfortunately, Henn's wife passed away in 1931. Henn lost his fortune during the Great Depression, and as he was unable to pay his taxes, Henn agreed to a settlement that enabled him to live in the house until his death at which time full ownership and use of the house and property would transfer to the City of Euclid. In 1947, upon Henn's passing, the city took possession and over subsequent years used the house for the extra school classrooms, offices of the Board of Education, and the headquarters of the Recreation Department. After, a new city hall was built, the house stood empty except for police and fire training. By the 1990s, the home had fallen into disrepair. In 1995, the Friends of the Henn Mansion formed to save the structure from demolition and raised funds to restore the mansion. Many of the architectural features have been maintained including the slate roof, leaded windows, and the grand staircase. Today, this former residence is on the National Register of Historic Places and is used as an event venue. The Henn Mansion anchors a 30-acre park and bird sanctuary on the scenic shores of Lake Erie with lakefront amenities, trails, and beaches.

The Cleveland Museum of Natural History, founded in 1920 and ranked among the top ten natural history museums nationally, celebrated the completion of a five-year-long, \$150 million renovation and expansion project in December 2024. Beginning in 2019 with the selection of the DLR Group (Cleveland office) to lead the “Centennial Transformation Project,” a new lobby, visitor hall, exhibit hall, and science labs were created and the planetarium, auditorium, and interior courtyard were renovated adding interactive and immersive elements for visitor experiences. The importance of glaciers and water in shaping Lake Erie and its environs are echoed in the new façade and roofline of the museum including the rippling, grooved panels that swirl from the roofline and cascade downward over the front wall. Mr. Westlake will describe the project and lead a tour of the museum.
